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9900 Wilshire Property Sold For \$148.3 Million

The world's richest man, Carlos Slim, has sold 9900 Wilshire Boulevard to a group of Asian investors for \$148.3 million

The new owners of the former Robinson's-May Department Store, are trophy property investors from Hong Kong and Singapore, who plan to create a landmark development on the eight-acre site at the intersection of Wilshire and Santa Monica Boulevards.

The consortium partners: Chow Tai Fook Group of Hong Kong, Wee Cho Yaw Family Group of Singapore, and David Chiu of Far East Consortium International Limited, previously purchased the Regent Beverly Wilshire, a Four Seasons Hotel, in 1995.

"This is an incomparable site that cannot be replicated and we intend to build a superb project offering world class luxury residences," said Daniel Yiu, the senior advisor to Joint Treasure, a group representing the investors. "Our investor group is interested only in premier properties in premier locations," he emphasized.

In 2007, the 9900 property was purchased for \$500 million by British developers Nicholas and Christian Candy and their CPC Group.

The property fell into foreclosure early this year and was acquired by Slim 's Banco Inbursa.

Slim's P Banco Inbursa set up a private bidding auction administered by Eastdil Secured and law firm Skadden Arps that was won by Joint Treasure International Ltd., a Hong Kong-based private equity firm specializing in global real estate.

Law firm Allen Matkins Leck Gamble Mallory & Natsis advised Joint Treasure in the transaction. Joint Treasure acted on behalf of the three aforementioned consortium partners.

Other U.S. properties that the Joint Treasure International consortium has acquired for its investors include the New York Four Seasons Hotel and two New York City apartment and condominium buildings.

The group also financed and launched development of a 76-acre, 12-city block mixed-use project on South Riverside Drive in New York City.

The group is now on its next cycle of investment and the mandate is to acquire major properties in Los Angeles, San Francisco, New York, London, Tokyo and Sydney.

The 9900 Wilshire site previously housed Robinson's-May for more than 50 years from 1952 to 2006.

The site was acquired by New Pacific Realty for \$33.5 million in 2004 and then sold to Candy & Candy three years later.

A previous 9900 Wilshire plan by architect Richard Meier, who designed the Getty Center, was approved by the City of Beverly Hills in 2008 for 235 condominiums and 17,000 square feet of retail, restaurant and garden space.

The size of the site and the lavish planned gardens will encourage far more outdoor living than is available in most high rise condominiums, Yiu said.

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
